## Late Dr Tan Eng Liang (陈英梁博士)

Dr Tan was a former Team Singapore water polo player and veteran sports official, who represented Singapore in various Major Games, including the Melbourne Olympics 1956. Some of his key achievements as an athlete include one bronze (1962) and two silver (1958, 1966) medals at the Asian Games and two South-east Asian Peninsular (SEAP) Games golds (1965, 1967).

### Mr Ng Ser Miang (黄思绵)

Mr Ng Ser Miang is a former Team Singapore sailor who was a member of the team who won Singapore's first sailing SEAP medal at the 1969 SEAP Games. After he retired as an athlete from his sport, he went on to contribute further in Singapore's sporting scene through numerous roles.

During her tenure as President, Singapore's bowling team saw six world champions (Remy Ong, Cherie Tan, Shayna Ng, Jasmine Yeong-Nathan, Joey Yeo and Jennifer Tan) who won numerous World Championships, Asian Championships, Asian Games and SEA Games medals.






#### Mr Kenneth Kee (纪山狮)

Mr Kenneth Kee built up a team that rose to become amongst the best in Asia from a group of neighbourhood players, who eventually participated in SEA Games 1979 and 1981, as well as Asian Games 1982. He was also the national team coach from 1979 to 1982.

A former Team Singapore water polo player, Mr Kenneth Kee first started off with swimming, before representing Singapore in water polo in six SEA Games between 1967 to 1977, winning gold each time. He also represented Singapore at the Asian Games in 1974 and 1978 where the team won a Bronze medal. He was also the national water polo team captain between 1975 to 1978, and during this period, the team won Team of the Year twice at the Singapore Sports Awards, in 1976 and 1978. Mr Kee went on to coach the national team between 1979 to 1982, and the water polo team subsequently also won the Team of the Year award multiple times in 1980, 1987, 1992, 1994, 1996, 2006 and 2014.
